

A Guide for Ukrainian Settlement in the Comox Valley

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Dear Ukrainians

The Comox Valley Ukrainian Cultural Society (CVUCS) sincerely welcomes you to Canada. We are very sad because of the situation in Ukraine. We regret that you had to leave your homes and go so far from your home, friends, and family. CVUCS is a non-profit organization. We are a cultural association that has organised volunteer help for Ukrainians displaced by war and arriving in the Comox Valley. We want to help you get settled in a new country as soon as possible. In this guide, we summarise the most important information, service providers and links to website sites that will help you become settled in the Comox Valley. We organise this information into ten settlement steps in order of priority. The Guide highlights important details and provides useful tips to help you accomplish these steps successfully.

We will also come to meet you soon and bring a welcome basket. We look forward to getting to know you and hopefully you will find that CVUCS offers a way to create your first friendships in Canada. If for some reason we don't come for a visit right away, please email and let us know you are here in the Comox Valley. (Email: cvukrainianculturalsociety@gmail.com)

We advise you to begin gathering your important Canadian documentation records soon after you arrive, because it will be more difficult to do it later when you get a job and may be busy working during business hours. Please know that the members of the Comox Valley Ukrainian Cultural Society are here to guide you through these steps. Please ask us questions and if we don't know the answers, we will help you find answers.

Here is our first helpful tip for you: Be prepared to work through these steps by having your original copies of your Ukrainian identification, passport, Canadian documents, CUAET documentation and all other original documents ready. We suggest getting a special folder to manage all your documents. Getting copies can be helpful, but many steps will involve using original documents. Protect all your original identification documents very carefully because you will need them many times during the first few months of settlement.

More helpful starting tips: We've organised this list of steps in order of priority to help simplify your settlement as a much as possible. These first few weeks in Canada are a tiring time, with many required steps involved, so please get plenty of rest when needed. Some gentle movement or walking may also help you soothe any confusion or anxiety you feel. Be patient. Soon you will feel more settled. And remember we are here to help you along the way.

1) Buy a SIM card for a mobile phone.

You need to buy a SIM card right away, because all government organisations, community service providers and potential employers will ask for your phone number. There are several large mobile operators in Canada: Telus, Rogers, Fido, and Bell are the names of some providers. Each provider will have contracts and plan details on their website. It is also important to know that in Canada you have to pay an additional \$50 for SIM card activation. This is a one-time payment. Whatever service you choose, always ask about discounts and whether it is possible to cancel the activation fee. It is often possible to negotiate a more affordable or better plan by asking lots of questions. Also ask about family plans if multiple family members need phones. Usually the best priced plan with these large service providers involves a contract where you agree to one to three years of service.

Cell phone plans in Canada are quite expensive, so it's good to know that money can be saved by choosing some of the simpler monthly phone services such as Public Mobile, Koodo and Chatr. These simple plans range from \$15-25 per month. You can use your existing phone, and after you purchase SIM card activation, you then pay per month for simple plans that include a set amount of long-distance minutes, unlimited texting, and some Internet data.

2) Open a bank account.

You must choose a bank for yourself. If you look online using the names of the banks, you can find details about each one on their websites. There are several large national banks in the Comox Valley: Royal Bank, Scotia Bank, Bank of Montreal, CIBC, and TD Bank. These large banks have services across Canada. There is also the Canadian Western Bank and the Coastal Community Credit Union. All are fully insured, accredited by the Canadian government and safe to use. All offer in-person and online banking services. Some banks will offer specialized services for newly settled Canadians. Always ask about services for new immigrants. These services might include low-fee accounts or credit cards. Some even offer one-time only bonus deposits when new Canadians open an account. It's good to do some research before deciding. You will need the original copy of your Ukrainian passport and Canadian work permit when you go to establish new bank accounts. If you think your family may move to another province, choose one of the national banks, then you won't need to change banks if you move. If you are confident about staying in the Comox Valley you may find that the Coastal Community Credit Union is helpful. The Canadian Western Bank operates in all the western provinces of Canada.

Helpful Tips: Ask the bank of your choice how to arrange electronic deposits in your new account(s). Sometimes the bank provides a form that can be used when setting up your accounts that will be helpful when applying for government financial benefits or employment payroll deposits. Each bank will organize their electronic deposits a little differently, so ask when you first open your bank accounts to make automatic payments of benefits or wages easier. Also ask how to set up online banking and your passwords. Most banking in Canada will be done online for bill payments and deposits such as payroll.

3) Get one-time financial assistance from Canadian government.

To receive one-time financial assistance from the federal government of Canada, you need to register:

Anyone who successfully obtained the CUAET (Canada-Ukraine Authorisation for Emergency Travel) qualifies for this assistance.

You will need a bank account first to receive the deposit.

Amount of financial assistance: CAD \$3,000 per adult and CAD \$1,500 per child.

Here are some helpful tips: Sometimes the website gives an error and it is not possible to register for help. If you need help, go to the Comox Valley Immigration Welcome Centre located at 407A-5th Street in Courtney and their staff will help you solve problems. Call the hotline together with their staff and find out what the problem is with your application. As a rule, the problem is with the UCI number. It is usually possible to solve all this by telephone. In step six we will discuss the Comox Valley Immigration Welcome Centre in more detail. They offer many helpful services for new Canadians.

Another helpful tip: Whenever you are working with federal government services of Canada, if you need in-person help, you can seek help at the Comox Valley Service Canada Centre. See more details in step four about the Service Canada Centre.

4) Get your SIN

Everyone in your family will need a Social Insurance Number which is your most basic Canadian identification. You will notice Canadians abbreviate this important number by calling it "SIN". You will use your SIN to obtain many other types of identification documents, banking services and after you have been hired by an employer. After you are employed you will use your SIN to pay taxes and receive future financial benefits from the government.

To get a SIN, you need to go to the Service Canada Centre:

You must have an original Ukrainian passport and an original work permit with you.

Helpful Tip: Your SIN card is confidential. It is your most important identity number in Canada. Protect your SIN as it is often used for fraud. It can be used for identity theft and can ruin your credit rating in Canada. Learn when the SIN is required in Canada and when to keep it private:

5) Register for MSP (Medical Services Plan) & BCService card

Everyone in British Columbia must enrol with MSP for their Medical Services Plan. Everyone is also eligible for a BC Service Card that provides their MSP identification for free health care called your Personal Health Number (PHN).

To do this, you need to visit the BC Service Centre.

Here are some helpful tips: You must have an original Ukrainian passport and an original Canadian work permit with you. Many organisations in Canada will ask for two photo documents that confirm your identification (ID). The BC Service card will provide you with one official photo ID card. You can also complete the MSP form for health insurance at the BC Service Centre. The ID cards themselves will arrive by mail within 2-3 weeks to the address you specify during registration. Often this is the address of the Canadian family with whom you temporarily live. Later, when you move to your rented accommodation, you must change the address to your permanent location. To do this, you will need to go to BC Service again.

A helpful tip: Whenever you are working with provincial government services of British Columbia, if you need in-person help, you can seek help at the Service BC Centre for help with any provincial government service.

6) Register at the Comox Valley Immigrant Welcome Centre

The Comox Valley Ukrainian Society recommends that you visit the Comox Valley Immigrant Welcome Centre to learn about all the services they offer new Canadians. Some of the services include free English language courses and other settlement services. Their staff can answer various questions about documents, immigration and how to successfully settle in Canada.

The free language classes are called LINC or Language Instruction for Newcomers to Canada. It is a functional literacy program using Canadian Language Benchmarks (CLB) that gives new Canadians English for daily life usage in CLB levels 1-4 in the Comox Valley and CLB levels 1-7 in nearby Campbell River. Space is often limited due to class sizes and student numbers.

CLB Levels 2 & 3 are currently offered online in a limited basis, and the online courses may change over time, please ask the Immigrant Welcome Centre for more details.

Proof of completion of Canadian Language Benchmarks (CLB) Level 4 or higher is one of the accepted proof of language for Canadian citizenship. If you decide not to use LINC classes for English, you can ask the Immigration Welcome Centre staff about other ways to provide proof of English or French language for Canadian citizenship.

7) Register in local schools and childcare

Schools K-12:

Public schools in Canada are free for all children from kindergarten to grade twelve. Your local school district is called Comox Valley Schools (SD #71). Your children have the right to an education while you have a work permit or later permanent residence status. In Canada children must go to the school that is located in your area nearby your home.

Helpful tips: It's also possible to find the school using Google Maps. Enter your address into Google Maps to see what is the name of the nearest school. It's helpful to think about where you live temporarily with your host family vs. where you may permanently settle in your first home. Registering at a school within easy walking distance of your home can be helpful when you first manage settlement in Canada, especially until you have a vehicle. If you have problems with online registration, go to the local school and they will help you in-person with any questions. You will need proof of your residence address, your child's birth certificate, any immigration documents, and any Canadian documents you may have obtained. Your child's Personal Health Number or PHN is also needed. Children who are older than five years of age by December 31 of the current school year are eligible for kindergarten.

Other Helpful tips: Currently the online registration requires a desk-top computer, not a cell phone or tablet for technology reasons. Registration forms will not permit submission until all required information is completed. Gathering everything will help make the application easier.

More Help: If you find the school registration online process confusing, go to the Comox Valley Schools office located at 607 Cumberland Road for some inperson help. Their staff will help you get started.

Early Childhood Learning Opportunities:

Finding connections with other Canadian parents with young children is a good way to learn about the many early childhood education opportunities in the Comox Valley. Childcare:

Securing safe, affordable, good quality childcare is challenging for working parents in Canada, but beginning to improve in costs. The fees for childcare are decreasing due to government subsidies aimed to provide parents with good quality childcare for affordable prices. When you successfully secure childcare at a licensed care centre, ask about the provider about government initiatives to reduce monthly costs. Childcare is offered by several private childcare services in the Comox Valley. You can find them on Google by using these Internet search words: "Daycare Comox Valley". Referrals by Comox Valley families that you begin to meet and trust are a good way to find trustworthy childcare.

Helpful Tip: It may be helpful to understand that childcare spaces are limited and all Canadian parents find childcare difficult to obtain. Finding local families who share your parenting values will be important because they can give you suggestions and once you form friendships, you will begin to build a support system for your family.

8) Complete mandatory medical exam within 90 days of arrival

Although this is step 8, it's *important* to get this step completed. It's mandatory. It is *important* to understand that not every doctor or medical centre can perform a medical examination for immigration to Canada. You must make an appointment with a certified doctor who is known as a "panel physician". The website link below will help you find one. Enter the country "Canada"; then province "British Columbia"; and then a list is given by city. Currently the closest panel physicians to the Comox Valley can be accessed in nearby cities named Campbell River, Nanaimo, Port Alberni, or Victoria. The list will be updated regularly, but at this time some travel will be necessary.

Beginning on October 01, 2022, the BC Ministry of Health began funding the medical examinations, including chest x-rays and blood tests, that Ukrainians under CUAET must complete within 90 days of arrival in British Columbia. You may ask at the Service BC Centre described in step five more details.

Those who may have already paid for testing can be reimbursed by sending the appropriate information to Health Insurance BC. The form required for reimbursement is available at: www.gov.bc.ca/MSP/eligibility.

9) Medical Care for Everyone & Support for Pregnancy

Important Medical Care Information for Everyone:

It can be difficult to find a family doctor in Canada due to a shortage of doctors. The best way to find a family doctor is to inquire at family medicine clinics to see if they are accepting new patients. Ask others that you meet and trust in the Comox Valley if they will ask their doctor to accept you or have they heard of any new doctors establishing practises. You may find that a search for a family doctor takes time, so it's important to know where to access urgent or emergency care in the Comox Valley. All of the care in this list is available free under our MSP or Medical Services Plan, with the exception of ambulance services which may cost about \$80 for paramedic transport to hospital.

Where to find support for pregnancy:

An important step for pregnant families newly arrived in Canada is to secure the care of either a physician or midwife. The physicians offering birth medical care will either be family doctors or specialists called obstetricians. Midwives are trained in the management of pregnancy, labour, birth and postpartum recovery. In Canada we also have caregivers called birth doulas whose primary role is offering pregnant women support during the birthing process. Internet searches can help locate some of these services. Most pregnancy medical services are free through our public health and others are private services available by fee for service.

Helpful starting information can be found on the websites for these organizations:

Island Health offers all kinds of free support for pregnant families from public health nurses under their program called Right Start. The health care they offer includes prenatal services, postpartum support, breastfeeding support, family health, and immunization. As soon as you know that you are pregnant, you can register to access all their services.

10) Obtain a BC Driver's Licence

Experienced Drivers: If you have come to Canada with a Ukrainian driving permit you can begin to drive legally in Canada for 90 days, giving you a chance to then obtain a BC driver's licence (BCDL). Once you are ready to exchange your Ukraine driver's licence for a BC driver's licence, you will need to complete a knowledge test and road test, much like any new driver in British Columbia.

New Drivers: The province of British Columbia has a multi-year graduated licensing program that requires 3 tests as you move from a learner's Permit, novice Permit and then a fully-licensed driver's permit. The first test is a multiple-choice knowledge test and then two road tests to demonstrate driving skills. Anyone older than 16 can begin the process and anyone under age 19 requires a parent or legal guardian's signature. The government organization that regulates driver's licences and vehicle insurance is called ICBC.

The Service BC Centre in Courtenay also serves as the ICBC Driver Licensing Office for the Comox Valley. Service BC is located at 2500 Cliffe Avenue. You can go to this location to ask questions. This website also offers all the details for obtaining a BC driver's licence:

Helpful Tips: When it comes time to take any of the three tests, you can book in a neighbouring city to get an appointment more quickly, rather than waiting weeks or months for testing in your home city. This is one way to speed up the multi-year process. The knowledge test is available in several languages, one being Russian. It's a good idea to check if more test languages, such as Ukrainian become available, by asking ICBC staff. You will perform the road tests in English. ICBC offers language services in both Russian and Ukrainian for general questions by telephone. Call **1-800-663-3051** and ask for translation. There are private driving instruction businesses in the Comox Valley that help new drivers learn the skills required for the road tests. They offer lessons for fees. You can find them on Google by using the search words: "driving lessons Comox Valley".

Very Helpful Tip: Obtain a copy of the book called **Learn to Drive Smart**. It is available online and in paper copy at the BC Service Centre or any ICBC office. It teaches everything you need to study for the knowledge and road tests. There are also practise knowledge tests available online on the ICBC website that are good training for passing the knowledge test successfully.

Families will register using some some photo identification for adults and birth certificates for children. Once registered then only the person picking up the food will need identification. They offer some limited home delivery for families with mobility issues. Here is the form for home delivery.

They also have a healthy families program that supports pregnant women and parents with young children from birth to 6 years.

The BC government offers up to CAD \$935/month for single adults and up to CAD \$1770/month for a family of four people for up to six months.

To apply you will need to have completed several of the ten settlement steps: The hardship assistance application requires these things:

- Email address
- SIN (Social Insurance Number)
- BCeID
- Photo Identification (eg. passport)
- Banking Direct Deposit Information
- Financial Information (eg. income and/or assets owned)

Or you can apply in-person at the Comox Valley Income Assistance office located at 730 Grant Avenue in Courtenay. Visit the office and their staff will guide you through the process. Some translation services may be available upon request. You can also call toll-free 1-866-866-0800 to ask about income assistance and translation services.

Trades in British Columbia are regulated by the Industry Training Authority (ITA) as a government service of British Columbia. There are over 100 trades recognized in British Columbia and 49 of these are Red Seal Trades. Red Seal is a system of apprenticeship and recognition of hours leading to certification.

The process for getting foreign credential recognition for degrees, diplomas, licences and certificates is regulated by various authorized organizations that determine occupational standards. This can be a long process. In most cases you will need to find the regulatory professional organization or trade apprenticeship authority to get specific instructions for your occupation credentials. Often people need to acquire greater proficiency in English before they can successfully obtain their occupation credentials in Canada. The best place to ask about how to obtain English proficiency for career advancement is the North Island College. Some courses for English proficiency are available online. A student visa from the Canadian government is required for courses longer than 6 months, but there are ways to register immediately upon arrival with your CUAET if your studies are less than 4 months per learning session.
